

Abdullahi Ahmed An-Na'im is Charles Howard Candler Professor of Law, and associated professor in the College of Arts and Sciences of Emory University, Atlanta, GA, and senior fellow of the Center for the Study of Law and Religion. An-Na'im is the author of: *What is an American Muslim* (2014); *Muslims and Global Justice* (2011); *Islam and the Secular State* (2008); *African Constitutionalism and the Role of Islam* (2006); and *Toward an Islamic Reformation: Civil Liberties, Human Rights and International Law* (1990). His edited books include *Human Rights under African Constitutions* (2003); *Islamic Family Law in a Changing World: A Global Resource Book* (2002); *Cultural Transformation and Human Rights in Africa* (2002); and *Human Rights in Cross-Cultural Perspectives: Quest for consensus* (1992). He has published more than 60 articles and book chapters on human rights, constitutionalism and Islam and politics in African and Islamic countries.
