

**Robert D. Crane** [transcendentlaw@aol.com] earned his *juris doctor* (JD) in 1959 from Harvard Law School in comparative legal systems and practiced communications law in Washington, DC with Haley, Wollenberg, and Bader. He spent the next twenty years working in think-tanks and government, serving as Deputy Director for Planning in the National Security Council and as US Ambassador to the United Arab Emirates. Since 1980, Dr. Crane has been a full-time Muslim activist. From 1992 – 1994, he served as director of the Legal Department at the American Muslim Council (AMC), and from 1985 to 1987 was director of Publications at the International Institute of Islamic Thought (IIIT), where he is currently a Scholar-in-Residence preparing an Encyclopedia on Faith-Based Justice.
