

**Ali A. Mazrui** [amazrui@binghamton.edu] was born in Mombasa, Kenya, on February 24, 1933. Dr. Mazrui obtained his BA with Distinction from Manchester University, UK, his MA from Columbia University in New York, and his Ph.D from Oxford University, UK. Prof. Mazrui currently serves as director, Institute of Global Cultural Studies, Binghamton University, State University of New York, Binghamton, NY; senior scholar in Africana Studies, Cornell University, Ithaca, NY; chancellor, Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology, Nairobi, Kenya (2004-2010); and Albert Luthuli Professor at Large, University of Jos, Nigeria. He has written more than twenty books and hundreds of articles. His latest book is *Islam between Globalization and Counterterrorism* (Oxford: James Currey Publishers and Trenton, NJ: Africa World Press, 2006). He is best known for his television series *The Africans: A Triple Heritage* (BBC/PBS, 1986), which included extensive coverage of Islam in Africa. Prof. Mazrui has served as professor of political science (1974-1991) and as director of the Center for Afro-American and African Studies (1978-1981) at The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan. He has also served as visiting scholar at the following national and international universities: Harvard, Stanford, Chicago, Colgate, Denver, Ohio State, Pennsylvania, Singapore, Australia, Malaysia, Oxford, Bridgewater, Cairo, Leeds, Nairobi, Teheran, London, Baghdad, McGill, Sussex, among others. Dr. Mazrui is widely consulted on many issues including constitutional change and educational reform. He has been involved in a number of UN projects on matters which have ranged from human rights to nuclear proliferation. He is editor of Volume VIII (Africa since 1935) of the UNESCO General History of Africa (1993). He won the Distinguished Faculty Achievement Award of The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, and the Distinguished Africanist Award of the African Studies Association of the USA. Since 2011 he has served as senior fellow of Prince Alwaleed bin Talal Center for Muslim-Christian Understanding, Georgetown University, Washington, DC, and is a member of the Royal Commonwealth Trust and the Atheneum Club (London) and the United Kenya Club (Nairobi). Prof. Mazrui's services to the Organization of African Unity and the African Union include membership of the Group of eminent persons appointed in 1992 by the OAU Presidential Summit to explore issues relating to: African Reparations for Enslavement and Colonization. He was also among the eminent personalities who advised on the transition from the OAU to the African Union (2002). Prof. Mazrui has received honorary doctorates in subjects which have ranged from divinity to humane letters and from African studies to development studies. He has served as AMSS President for two terms (2007-2011). He has five sons and one daughter.
