She has worked with development programs and policies for low-income families in various countries, including the United States. Early community-based experiences with the African-American population in health and education enhanced her subsequent work with Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) in India, Indonesia, Thailand, and her native Bangladesh. She is writing a book entitled *Redefining Manhood: Gender Empowerment, Poverty Alleviation and Masculinity*, based on her ethnographic research with Grameen Bank sharecropper families. Current research interests include gender, globalization, and Islam. She was a fellow (1995-97) at the Radcliffe Public Policy Institute and instructor at the Harvard School of Public Health (1998-2002). She was a David E. Bell Fellow at the Center for Population and Development Studies at Harvard University (2003-2004), a scholar at the Brandeis Women's Studies Research Institute (1997-2006), and a visiting scholar at the Women's Studies Program at Northeastern University (2005-2006). She served as director of Women's Studies at Indiana University of Pennsylvania since 2006, and joined the Miami University of Ohio in 2008. Her writings have appeared in the *National Women's Studies Association Journal*, *Journal of Comparative Studies of South Asia, Asia and Middle East (CSSAME)*, *Feminist Formations*, the *International Journal of Feminist Politics* and the *Encyclopedia for Women in Muslim Cultures*.
