

Hanadi Al-Samman [ha2b@virginia.edu] is assistant professor of the Arabic language and literature in the Department of Middle Eastern and South Asian Languages and Cultures (MESALC), University of Virginia, Charlottesville, VA. Her research focuses on Middle Eastern and Arab women's studies, transnational and Islamic feminism(s), postcolonial and identity formation theories, as well as literature of the Arab diaspora. Her current research interests examine the status of gay studies in modern Arabic literature. Her research has been published in the *Journal of Arabic Literature*; *Women's Studies International Forum*; *Alif: Journal of Comparative Poetics*; and in edited collections of translated literary works. She is currently working on a book manuscript entitled, *Anxiety of Erasure: Trauma, Authorship, and the Diaspora in Arab Women's Narrative*. The book examines the literature of Arab women writers of the European and North American diaspora, and formulates a theory of Arab women's authorship influenced by Shahrazād's orality syndrome, anxiety of erasure, and the pre-Islamic tradition of female infanticide (*wa'd al-banāt*).
