

Hilal Elver [elver@global.ucsb.edu] has been research professor of global studies at the University of California Santa Barbara since 2002. Currently she is a Fulbright visiting research chair in comparative law and legal pluralism at McGill University, Canada. She has both a law degree and Ph.D from the University of Ankara Law School, Turkey, and an SJD from UCLA Law School, CA. She started her teaching career at the University of Ankara Faculty of Law in 1985. During this period, she was also appointed by the Turkish government as the founding legal advisor of the Ministry of Environment and became the general director of Women's Studies in the Office of the Prime Minister. In 1994, she was appointed to the UNEP Chair in Environmental Diplomacy by the United Nations Environment Program at the Mediterranean Academy of Diplomatic Studies in Malta. Since 1996 she has been teaching at several universities in the United States and abroad. Her publications have focused mainly on international environmental law, and international human rights law. Her book, *Peaceful Uses of International Rivers: Case of Euphrates and Tigris Rivers*, was published in 2002. Her most recent book, *The Headscarf Controversy, Secularism and Freedom of Religion*, will be published in February 2012 by Oxford University Press. She teaches comparative international law, international human rights law, and global environmental law.
