He studied at Imam Hatip School for six years to become an Imam. He holds a BA (2006) in Islamic education from Ankara University, Turkey, and an MA (2009) in theological studies from the University of Saint Thomas, Houston, TX. His main research interests include interreligious dialogue among Abrahamic religions, Islamic history, and comparative religious studies.
