

Marianne Farina [mfarina@dspt.edu] is a Catholic religious sister of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, Notre Dame, IN. She is assistant professor at the Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology in Berkeley, CA. Dr. Farina teaches courses that focus on such subjects as social ethics, virtue, sexual ethics, philosophical ethics, Islamic philosophy, human rights, faith formation, and Muslim-Christian dialogue. She received her MA in pastoral theology from Santa Clara University, CA, and her Ph.D in theological ethics from Boston College, MA. Dr. Farina worked for 11 years in Bangladesh as a teacher, pastoral assistant and school supervisor. While in Bangladesh, she ministered with Muslim, Christian, Hindu, Buddhist and tribal families and communities. With more than 25 years of experience in education and pastoral ministry, she has worked in education and social development projects that promote social justice and interfaith dialogue. Over the last three years, Dr. Farina traveled throughout Africa and Indonesia as a delegate and teacher covering such topics as religion and democracy, methods for cross-cultural understanding, interfaith dialogue, and human rights. Her recent writings have focused on the following topics: Virtue Theories of Thomas Aquinas and Hamid al-Ghazali; Challenges of Muslim-Christian Dialogue; Faith in Human Rights; and Identity and Exclusion: Totalizing Texts in Interreligious Dialogue. Dr. Farina also offers a number of workshops for local communities that include teacher trainings for religious education, cross-cultural communication, and methods of interfaith dialogue.
