

Muhamad Ali [muhamad.ali@ucr.edu] is assistant professor in the Religious Studies Department, and is affiliated with Southeast Asia: Text, Ritual, and Performance (SEATRIP) at the University of California, Riverside. Dr. Ali received a BA in Islamic studies from the State Islamic University (Indonesia), an MM-CAAE from the University of Indonesia and the University of Grenoble, Paris, France, an M.Sc from the Department of Islamic and Middle Eastern Studies, University of Edinburgh, and a Ph.D in history (Southeast Asia, the Middle East, Europe and world history) from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. His dissertation examines the relationship between Dutch, British and Japanese colonialism and transmission of Islamic knowledge in Indonesia and Malaysia. He was a fellow at the East-West Center, Hawaii, where he served as research assistant on ethnic conflict in Southeast Asia and attended courses on cultural studies. Specializing in Islamic studies, Dr. Ali has been writing and speaking on *jihad*, violence and peace, gender relationship, Islam and the West, interfaith dialogue and global education, Islam and politics, and religious pluralism. His recent publications include a book titled: *Multicultural-Pluralist Theology* (Kompas, 2003); entries on women and *jihad* in the *Encyclopedia of Women and Islamic Culture*, 2004; articles on “Interfaith Marriage in Indonesia,” in *Studia Islamika*, 2003; “liberal Islam in Indonesia,” in the *American Journal of Islamic Social Sciences (AJISS)* 2005; and entries on categories of Muslims in *Moussons*, Paris, 2007; and book chapters on “Moderate Islam in Indonesia” (2007); “Religious Pluralism and Freedom in Indonesia” (2007); and “Islam in Southeast Asia” (2008). Prof. Ali has taught such courses as Qur’anic studies, Islam and international relations, Muslim politics, Asian religions, and Islam in Southeast Asia. In the 2008-2009 academic year, he will teach courses on religion, politics and public discourse, and peace in the Middle East.
