Muna Ali [muna.ali@asu.edu] is a Ph.D candidate in anthropology at Arizona State University, Tempe, AZ. Her dissertation project explores issues of identity, American-Muslim cultural practices/expressions and intra-community relations among second and subsequent generations of Muslim Americans (the offspring of converts and immigrants). She is particularly interested in how these younger Muslims define self and community, how they negotiate fissures and fault lines (ethnicity, race, class, gender, and religious interpretation) within their communities, and what the defining characteristics of a more authentic Islam in America are, and how they are manifested in daily life. Ms. Ali's research interests include immigration, Arab Americans, Western Muslims, religion in the public sphere, and culture and health. Her MA thesis, "Authoring Self in Post-911 Muslim American Identity" was an ethnographic study of Arizona Muslims. She was a Co-PI of an oral history project of Arizona Muslims and showcased that history in a public exhibit and a street festival. She published a text book chapter on "Arab and Muslim Americans" and is currently working on an edited book, Olive Oil on Hamburger?': Inter-cultural Marriages among North American Muslims (working title) in collaboration with Muslim couples in these marriages. She has presented papers at the Society for the Anthropology of Religion and the Islamic Studies Section of the AAR-Western Region Conferences titled: "Authoring Self in Post 9/11 Muslim American Identity" and "Muslim-Americans: Defying the 'Islam and the West' Boundaries" respectively. In addition to numerous lectures to corporations and governmental organizations as well as civic and interfaith groups, she presented a lecture on "Conflict Resolution Strategies in Muslim American Communities" at the Arizona Association for Conflict Resolution and in-services to healthcare professional on "Providing Culturally Appropriate Healthcare." She cofounded the Muslim Graduate Student Group at ASU-Tempe, Islamic Speakers Bureau of Arizona and Arizona Muslim Historical Society. She is also a healthcare professional and community organizer.
