

Wendy Cadge [wcadge@brandeis.edu] is assistant professor of sociology at Brandeis University, MA. She writes and teaches about religion, medicine, immigration and sexuality in the contemporary United States. Her first book *Heartwood: the First Generation of Theravada Buddhism in America* (University of Chicago Press, 2005) examines how immigrant Buddhists from Thailand and mostly white convert Buddhists in the United States understand and practice Buddhism in their daily lives. She has also published articles in peer-reviewed journals about religion and public opinion about same-sex marriage, conflicts over homosexuality in mainline Protestant churches, inter-religious dialogues of Buddhist and Catholic nuns, religion and the non-profit sector, religious identity, and other issues. During the 2008-2009 academic year, Dr. Cadge will be a fellow at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University where she is working on a book manuscript titled: *Paging God: Religion in the Halls of Medicine*, about the formal and informal presence of religion and spirituality in hospitals. The book draws from historical and policy documents as well as from more than one hundred interviews with hospital chaplains, nurses, and physicians in large academic medical centers. This book complements related articles that Prof. Cadge recently published about the prayers people write in hospital prayer books (in *Poetics*), the ways pediatricians and pediatric oncologists understand religion (in the *Journal of Pediatric Hematology and Oncology*), and the fraction of hospitals nationally that have chaplains (in the *Southern Medical Journal*). She received a BA from Swarthmore College and a Ph.D in sociology from Princeton University. She was a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Scholar in health policy research at Harvard University from 2004-2006 and has held tenure track positions at Bowdoin College and Brandeis University.
