

**Zainab Alwani** [zainab.alwani@howard.edu] is assistant professor of Islamic studies at the Howard University School of Divinity, Washington, DC. Dr. Alwani is an acclaimed Islamic scholar, researcher and international speaker specializing in family law and women's issues. She received her Ph.D. in Islamic sciences from the International Islamic University in Malaysia. She is the first female jurist to serve on the board of the Fiqh Council of North America and currently serves as the Council's Vice-Chair. Her research which focuses on Islamic Jurisprudence, Qur'anic studies, the relationship between civil and religious laws in the area of family, gender and family relations within an Islamic framework, interreligious studies and conflict resolution, seeks to contribute to a theology of tolerance. She has authored and co-authored a wide variety of publications ranging from textbooks to scholarly articles.
