Atif Khalil is associate professor in the Department of History and Religion at the University of Lethbridge (Alberta, Canada) where he has been teaching for more than fifteen years. He is also the administrative director of the institution's Khan Endowment for the Study of Islam, created after 9/11 to advance the scholarly analysis of the faith in southern Alberta and promote better relations between the local largely immigrant Muslim population and the surrounding regional communities. His research interests lie primarily in the fields of Islamic mysticism and virtue ethics and secondarily in Islamic theology and philosophy, Orientalism and Islamophobia, comparative mysticism, and the medieval Judeo-Islamic tradition. Khalil is the author of *Repentance and the Return to God:* Tawba *in Early Sufism* (Albany: State University of New York Press, 2018) and more than sixty academic articles and reviews. He is also co-editor of *In Search of the Lost Heart* (Albany: SUNY, 2012), *Mysticism and Ethics in Islam* (Beirut: American University of Beirut Press, 2022), and *I of the Heart* (Leiden: Brill, forthcoming). Currently, he is writing a monograph on the theory and practice of *dhikr* (meditation, invocation, remembrance) in Islam and an introductory book on Sufism (Routledge, under contract).
